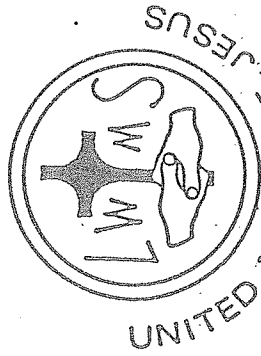

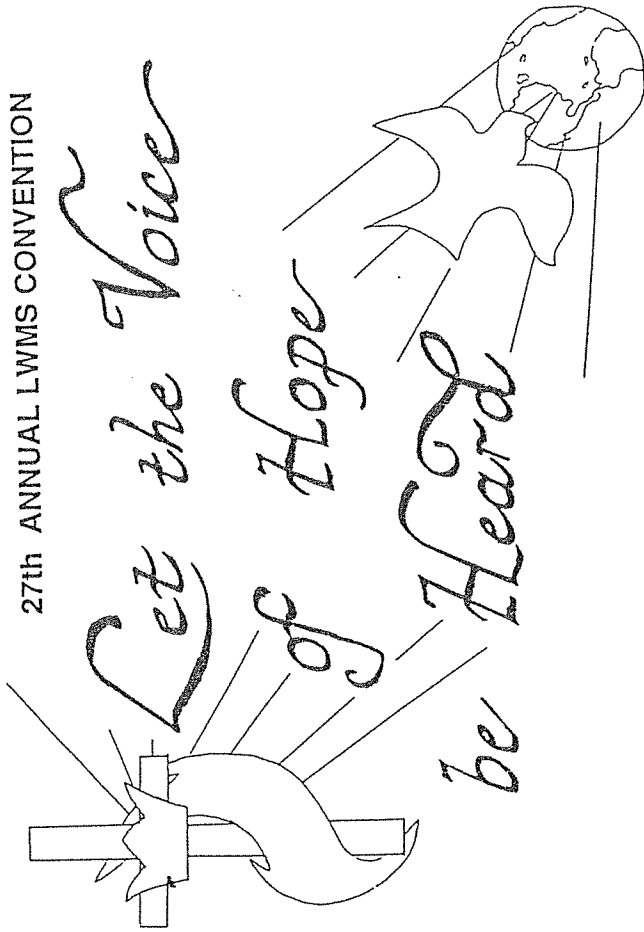

Vice President

1. Preside at the meeting of the circuit officers, twice a year. Confer with the circuit president in preparing an agenda prior to the meetings.
2. Perform the presidential duties in the absence of the president.
3. Head the Spiritual Growth Committee, which consists of the two Spiritual Growth Laywomen and the Spiritual Growth Pastor.
4. Call meetings of the Spiritual Growth Committee when necessary and inform members of the committee as to the place and time.
5. Be the historian of the circuit.
6. Co-ordinate the work of the LWMS with the Spiritual Growth Committee.
7. See to it that the proposals and projects of the Spiritual Growth Committee are carried out.
8. Keep a library of all materials prepared by the LWMS.
9. Work with the Spiritual Growth Committee in assisting the host congregation with displays.
10. Refer to the Duties of the Spiritual Growth Committee and suggested activities.

Secretary

1. Keep a list of all member pastors and reporters and names of all non-member pastors and contact ladies. Supply list to all officers, reporters, pastors, and contact ladies.
2. Keep list of names, addresses and terms of office of all officers. Supply list to all officers, reporters, pastors, and contact ladies.
3. Keep minutes of all circuit rallies and officer meetings. Supply minutes of the circuit rallies to all reporters, pastors and contact ladies within 2 weeks after the rallies. Supply minutes of the officer meetings to all officers within 2 weeks after the meetings.
4. Send out rally invitation letters to all reporters, pastors, officers and contact ladies along with bulletin inserts, etc. which have been supplied by the Spiritual Growth Committee. These are to be sent out at least six weeks prior to the rally.
5. The secretary has a number of mailings to do which need to be done on a timely basis. Refer to the Officers Handbook, the officers duties listed in the constitution, and refer any questions to the president.

Spiritual Growth Laywoman

1. Attend circuit office meetings, Spiritual Growth Committee meetings, and circuit rallies.
2. Publicize the purpose and activity of the LWMS and circuit in every possible way.
3. Be prepared to suggest speakers for circuit meetings and mission box projects.
4. Help prepare bulletin inserts for the circuit rallies.
5. Help with the preparation of displays at circuit rallies.
6. Actively promote use of all LWMS materials - TOPICS, OUTREACH, mission boxes, LWMS pins, LWMS brochures, etc.
7. Assist where needed in the planning and preparing of the circuit Winter Retreat.
8. Refer to the Officers Handbook and the suggested activities of the Spiritual Growth Committee for additional duties.

Pastoral Advisor

1. *He shall attend the meetings of the circuit officers and circuit rallies.*
2. *He shall work with the host pastor of the rallies prepare the closing devotion at the rallies.*
3. *He shall be the spiritual advisor and general counselor at all meetings of the circuit.*

HOME MISSIONS

HOME MISSION TAPED SERVICES PROGRAM

Sometimes WELS members find themselves living in areas where there is no WELS church within driving distance. Still we are concerned that these fellow Christians are served with the Word. The Taped Services Program meets the need with weekly worship services that are recorded and sent to WELS members and others in areas remote from a WELS service in the United States and overseas. It has happened that families using these recordings have gathered a nucleus for the beginning of a new mission congregation

HOME MISSION FOREIGN LANGUAGE STUDY FUND

Foreign languages in Home Missions? As we reach out to more and more of our fellow Americans, who speak a language other than English as their first language, we see the need to be able to communicate the gospel in a language these people know and understand. The proceeds from this fund provide foreign language study for vicars, pastoral candidates, pastors and others who serve in Home Mission fields where foreign language services are required. Currently Spanish language skills are needed in many new mission fields.

WORLD MISSIONS

MISSIONARY CONFERENCES FUND

It is essential, from time to time, to have conferences involving missionaries from each of our world mission fields in order to coordinate the overall WELS world mission program. These conferences are held every two years and depend entirely on non-budgetary gifts for funding.

BOOKS FOR MISSIONS FUND

This fund provides books and literature for all our world mission fields, working libraries for our overseas national pastors and, under certain circumstances, for those in foreign countries who inquire concerning our synod's confessional position.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE HOST CONGREGATION

1. OPENING DEVOTION (Host Pastor)

The host pastor will be responsible for the opening devotion. This will include a 10 to 12 minute sermonette, prayer, and hymn which should, if possible, relate to the theme of the rally or at least to the general theme of mission work.

An offering will be gathered after the sermonette and before the prayer and closing hymn.

The host Pastor will be responsible for providing an organist and designating persons to gather the offering.

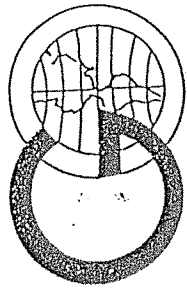
A mission song sung by the host congregation's choir is a welcome and encouraged addition to the morning devotion, but is not mandatory.

2. WELCOME

A lady from the host congregation (either the president of the Women's Guild, the LWS reporter, or anyone so designated) should be on hand to say a few words of welcome to the people gathered to the rally. Her opening comments could also include some words on the importance of mission work, a little information on the history of her congregation (and/or items of interest about her church's building facility), and any worthwhile information of a practical nature.

3. AGENDA

The host congregation will be responsible for printing the agenda for the rally. A sample agenda should be provided by the circuit president or secretary as well as an estimate of the number of agenda's needed.

I am LeAnn Eyerman and I believe the Lord has given me a special opportunity. The WELS Board for World Missions has approved a pilot project in which I would help the missionaries on Taiwan. As a layperson, I would use my talents to develop contacts with the nationals. Through these contacts both the missionaries and I would then seek to make Gospel presentations.

Because this is a pilot project, it is policy that it be funded initially outside of the budget of the Synod. After evaluation the pilot project may be absorbed into the budget.

I am delighted to be considered for participation in this project!

WHY SUCH A PROJECT NOW?

Worldwide, eighty-three percent (83%) of the nations have closed their doors to traditional missionaries who want to plant churches in their countries.

Consequently, the Board for World Missions is looking for alternate methods of entering such countries. This pilot project is designed not only to serve Taiwan but also to explore ways of using laypersons in the "closed" countries.

The Lord has opened many doors in Taiwan and the time seems right for this type of mission effort. One of the obstacles to communicating the Gospel is making significant contacts with the local people. A lay person's talents can be used to offer the local people some education/training that they perceive as helpful. In this process personal contacts may give the opportunity to share the Gospel.

This pilot project is being tried in Taiwan because the country is still open. After being tested, it may be a way to reach into the eighty-three percent of the countries that have closed their doors. (For example, Christian English teachers are welcomed in mainland China and have opportunities to witness.)

MATCHING THE PERSON TO THE PROJECT

LeAnn has a unique combination of training and experience for this type of project.

She has experience working in a different culture. She spent two years in Jamaica. Her title was "Youth Programme Developer" under the guidance of Jamaica 4-H Clubs. To carry out this work, she lived among the local people and was soon able to communicate adequately with them in Patois (their local language). She developed programs on nutrition and meal planning that were adopted by the local people. LeAnn found many opportunities to witness to the Gospel.

LeAnn is currently developing educational programs as a County Extension Agent in eastern Ohio. These programs include: rebuilding the home economics portion of the County Extension Service, managing the local 4-H program, developing volunteer leaders and teaching foods and nutrition.

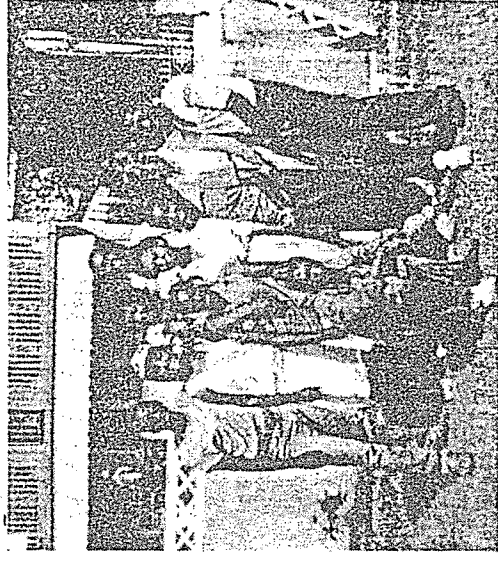
LeAnn is a graduate of The Ohio State University with a bachelor of science degree. Her master's degree in Food Science is from the University of Massachusetts. She has received several awards and honors in her field.

The church is an important part of LeAnn's life. She has served in the evangelism program, has been an organist and taught Sunday school.

HOW WILL THIS PROJECT WORK?

LeAnn will:

- * study TESL (Teaching English as a Second Language) right now so that she can immediately teach English classes in Taiwan.
- * consciously work as a member of the Taiwan missionary team.
- * consult with missionaries and church members to determine how her talents can best reach out to the Chinese in Taiwan.
- * develop her skills in Mandarin by beginning language study in the U.S. and developing them further by living with a family or students in Taiwan.
- * after a period of observation begin to develop programs that are relevant to a rapidly changing culture.
- * assist the missionaries in any appropriate way in discipling women and children through Bible study and fellowship activity.



LeAnn consciously used her contacts with these young people in Jamaica to share the Gospel.

4. REGISTRATION

The host congregation is responsible for taking care of the rally registration. A list of circuit congregations should be given to the host congregation by the circuit secretary. The host congregation should then provide a registration sheet for each of the congregations so that persons attending from the respective congregations may sign the list for their congregation and complete their name tags.

The host congregation also bears the responsibility for providing name tags, folders containing the agenda and any other information pertinent to the rally, pencils, pads, etc.. Usually such material as folders, pads, pencils, etc., are available free of charge when requested from the local AAL representative, although the host congregation may provide these materials in whatever manner it desires. The Board will provide other information to be included in the folders prior to the rally, such as the treasurer's report, the minutes of the last rally, etc..

5. SET-UP OF EQUIPMENT

Either the circuit secretary or a representative of the Spiritual Growth Committee will inform the host congregation of equipment needs. Since this equipment is most often the property of the host congregation, someone should be on hand who is familiar with the equipment to help put it in place and, if necessary, operate it.

To avoid unnecessary confusion and delay, the host congregation is asked to have near at hand a table and four chairs from which the circuit officers may conduct the business meeting. The host congregation should also see to it that any needed equipment (such as a filmstrip projector, screen, blackboard, extension cord, etc.) is on hand so that the business of the rally can be carried on without delay.

6. DISPLAYS

The host congregation bears the primary responsibility for taking charge of the placement of any appropriate displays or banners. In this function, however, the host congregation can expect to receive as much guidance and assistance as desired from the Spiritual Growth Committee.

7. HISTORIAN-PHOTOGRAPHER

Since the circuit officers are attempting to maintain an ongoing record of the Buckeye Circuit rallies, it would be appreciated if the host congregation could assist in this project by designating someone with a camera to take photographs of the rally. The quality of the camera used and the experience of the photographer need not be a major concern, although color photographs would be preferred. The vice-president of the circuit, who serves as the circuit historian, will be on hand to advise the photographer as to the kind and number of photographs desired, and the photographs, when developed, should be forwarded to her.

If providing a photographer or camera should, for some reason, not be possible, this should be communicated to the vice-president no later than two weeks prior to the rally so that other arrangements can be made.

8. MEALS

A major function of the host congregation is that of providing food and beverage for the opening coffee hour and the noon meal. Each host congregation is to make its own decisions as to the variety of foods and beverages it desires to offer. The standard and acceptable fare used at most rallies is as follows:

Morning Coffee Hour	Beverage: coffee, tea and milk
Food:	doughnuts, sweet rolls, cookies, etc. or any combination thereof.

Moan Meal

Beverage: coffee, tea and milk

Food: The standard procedure has been for the host congregation to provide a light lunch of salads and desserts together with whatever additional garnishes (such as bread and butter, pickles, celery, and carrot sticks, crackers, etc. the host congregation may wish to offer unless the host congregation informs the circuit officers that it desires to provide a complete meal.

Simplicity is encouraged so that the emphasis of the rally for the host ladies can always remain the mission presentation rather than the meal.

9. ELECTIONS

Election of officers takes place at each Spring Rally. Ordinarily the pads provided in each folder make excellent ballots when torn in halves or fourths; if, however, pads have not been included in the folders, it will be the responsibility of the host congregation to provide ballots for the election.

10. DIRECTIONS TO HOST CHURCH

The host congregation is asked to provide copies of directions or maps which will enable those driving from distant circuit congregations to locate the host church with ease. These maps should be in the hands of the circuit secretary no later than three weeks before the rally.

11. BABYSITTING

At the Spring Rally, 1987 it was voted that baby sitting would be mandatory at all rallies in the future and that this service would be provided by the host congregation. The reporter or Pastor of each congregation is to notify the host congregation two weeks prior to the rally with the names and ages of the children attending so that plans can be made by the host congregation as to the number of baby sitters that will be needed, the amount of refreshments needed, etc..

It is suggested that the children be divided into two groups:

- a. 2 year olds and younger
- b. 3 year olds and older

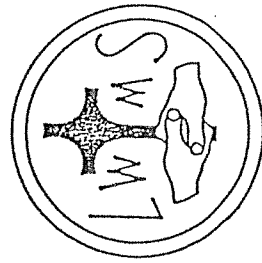
All children are to bring their own prepared sack lunch but the host congregation is to provide refreshments. The circuit's Working Fund will pay \$10.00 per sitter for the day and there should be a sitter provided for each group of six (6) children. It is best that there be separate baby sitting facilities for the two separate groups listed above and that these facilities not be at the church where the rally is taking place. Maps to the baby sitting facilities should be made available by the host congregation and available at the registration hour.

At the end of the rally the LAMS reporter or designate from the host congregation, will need to present the circuit treasurer with a bill for the baby sitting services and the treasurer will pay the host congregation at that time.

DUTIES OF THE BUCKEYE CIRCUIT REPORTERS

1. Shall receive the national LUMS Outreach and TOPICS (along with fliers promoting sale of TOPICS) from the national LUMS office.
2. Shall transmit national LUMS information and Buckeye Circuit news, plus all other pertinent information, to their congregation in cooperation with their Pastor.
3. Shall order TOPICS, the LUMS Outreach, mission boxes, lapel pins, brochures, etc. from the LUMS Central Office using the current order form for those ladies who wish to have them ordered in their congregation.
4. Shall forward signed (by the Pastor) membership form and membership fee of \$25.00 to the national LUMS treasurer by May 15 of each year. (Note - this is to be mailed prior to completing #7.)
5. Shall forward to the Buckeye Circuit vice-president the circuit nomination of officers names and mission box project ideas prior to January 15 of each year. (Note - this is for the nomination of officers and mission box projects for the circuit only.)
6. Shall send the national LUMS nomination of officers names to the national LUMS secretary by December 1 of each year. (Note - this is for the nomination of officers for the national LUMS only.)
7. Shall mail in the ballots from your congregation for the election of national officers and selection of the mission box projects to the national LUMS secretary by June 1 of each year. Only one set of mail-in ballots per LUMS member congregation is to be sent in. (Note - this is for the election of officers and mission box projects for the national LUMS only.)
8. Shall send proper papers containing information regarding appointed or elected delegate and alternate to the LUMS National Convention, held in June each year, to the national LUMS secretary before the deadline date on the registration form.

9. Shall promote attendance at the LWS National Convention, held in June of each year, and forward reservations to the LWS secretary as outlined on the registration form.
10. Shall collect the mission box project contributions twice a year, March and September, and send a check for the total contributions to the Buckeye Circuit treasurer prior to the Spring and Fall rallies each year.
11. Shall advise the Buckeye Circuit reporter of the host congregation at least two weeks before the circuit rallies, the names and ages of those children who will need babysitting at the rallies. These children will need to bring a sack lunch with them.
12. Shall maintain a library for your congregation consisting of the National LWS constitution, the Buckeye Circuit constitution, all copies of the LWS publication entitled "Outreach", a copy of every TOPICS booklet, all circuit reports and news, copies of the circuit minutes, and other pertinent LWS information.
13. Shall be responsible for coordinating the activities, as outlined in the "Host Responsibilities" book, when your congregation is the host of a rally or retreat.
14. Shall receive from the Buckeye Circuit secretary a list of all of the churches, their pastors and reporters names and addresses; minutes of the Spring and Fall rallies; and all other pertinent information of the Buckeye Circuit.
15. Shall receive from the national LWS central office the minutes of the convention, treasurer's report, and all other information about the LWS National Convention each year.

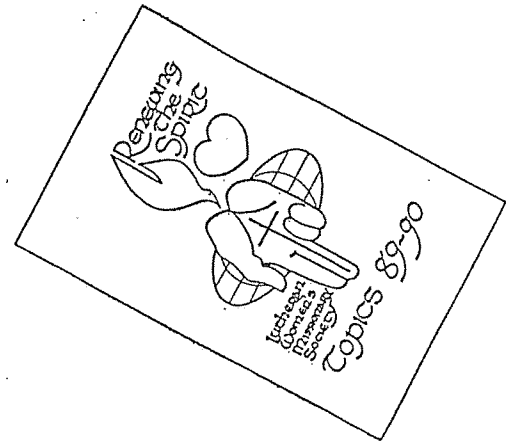


UNITED TO SERVE JESUS

What is more, the authors and editors themselves have had the opportunity to present their personal testimonies of the inestimable grace of God at work in their lives and the lives of others.

The fellowship and love existing between the members of LWMS is something that cannot be overstated. To be able to sit down and plan, to worship, to have fun and friendship with someone whom you have never seen or met before is a thrill that can be likened only to the joy that we shall all feel when we are called to encircle the throne of the lamb whom we love and serve.

Each year a reunion takes place. When friends and "sisters" get together to celebrate their Christian love something wonderful happens. The sparkle that can be seen in the eyes of those who come together as friends year after year is caused by the joy and love in Christ that binds women together even though separated by many miles and many years.

Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."
